DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

I would imagine nearly everybody has heard of "Dracula". Most will have read the great Bram Stoker novel and/or seen at least one of the many 'Dracula' movies. Not so many have seen the theatrical version. Yet it was this very version you are seeing tonight (albeit with a few changes) that was the very first dramatization from the novel. Written by permission of Bram Stocker's widow, an actor/producer/writer - Hamilton Deane, staged his version in England in 1924. Despite being paned by most critics, it was a huge hit and ran for over ten years with Hamilton Deane's company at one time having three touring groups as well as his London permanent venue. Of course Broadway, USA wanted it too. In 1927 "Dracula" opened in New York to packed houses but a reporter, John Balderston, had completely re-written it (despite Deane's name as coauthor) and this is the version that played there and still survives today. Mr. Balderston used very little of Hamilton's original work even_strangely ex-changing Mina for Lucy. Mina doesn't even appear! In the Balderston version Dracula's 'earth boxes' arrive by 'plane and not by ship therefore no mention of terrified sailors disappearing at sea.

In Seattle, two years ago, I found a copy of the Hamilton Deane original stage play that has never been published and decided to give it another 'airing.' You are the lucky 'victims'. I do not believe it has been staged for about seventy years so perhaps we are making history here tonight? It is scary and when it was performed all those years ago the billboards read:- "Nurse in attendant." "Smelling salts available in the foyer." "Doctor close by." I am sure none of these people or smelling salts will be necessary tonight (and I DO hope not) but I know you will be chilled and perhaps frightened, as it is a very gripping and shocking story.

I have a fine cast with some new faces too, but not enough space to laud any praise on them. Cast, you are wonderful! I have to say a very special thank you to my beautiful producer, Cathy Wight. She is a director's dream. Warm, kind, considerate, ultra efficient, pretty to boot, etc etc. and held the cast together after another berating from me! Thanks to our stage manager, set designer, co builder, lighting designer, Mr. Peter Phillips (where would I be without him?), David Godfrey (special effects), Violetta Kanarek (costumes) and EVERYBODY else who has given up their time, talents, energy, etc to make this production so great. I could not do this without any of you. Look at all their names in the programme and tell them how wonderful they are.

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

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

Betty Wells.....Angelica Borden





Lucy Godalming......Janine Moss



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
